The ability to standout and remain connected elevates impact.

In a recent meeting, a team-leader said, “Tom really adds a lot.” In order to “add a lot,” people must find their place in relation to others.

Three ways to help others standout:

## TSA Travel Tips: Traveling With Portable Oxygen

When traveling with portable oxygen, the first thing travelers should do is contact their airline. Not all airlines allow the use of portable oxygen concentrators, so that's a very important first step. Travelers should also check with the manufacturer to determine whether their specific oxygen concentrator is approved for in-flight use.



Here's what passengers can expect when traveling with portable oxygen through TSA checkpoints:

- If a passenger can disconnect from his or her portable oxygen, it's recommended that the passenger check the equipment as checked baggage whenever possible. This makes the screening process simpler for all involved.
- Passengers who can disconnect are able to be screened using imaging technology or walk-through metal detectors.
- If a passenger cannot disconnect, or chooses not to be screened by imaging technology or a walk-through metal detector, he or she will be screened using a pat-down procedure instead. A pat-down procedure is also used to resolve any alarms from a metal detector or anomalies identified by imaging technology.
- If a passenger is bringing his or her portable oxygen concentrator in carry-on baggage, the equipment will either undergo X-ray screening or inspection. If the passenger's respiratory equipment cannot be X-rayed and an inspection is done, it also will be tested for traces of explosives. If explosive material is detected, the passenger will have to undergo additional screening.

Passengers are encouraged to consult with their doctors to determine whether they can safely disconnect during screening. It is important for a passenger to inform the officer conducting the screening whether he or she can disconnect before the screening process begins. If an officer insists that you disconnect, please request to speak with a supervisor or manager.

Successful leadership depends on what you don't see – secret decisions that are spread out over time and go nearly unnoticed.

What you see, when you observe successful leaders in action, is the result of small, private, unremarkable choices.

On their own, individual choices often feel insignificant. But, the piling up of insignificant decisions forms you. Little things make us who we are.

### Six small choices:

1. Stop using others as excuses. You are smaller than the people you hide behind.
2. Choose vulnerability over wall-building. Barriers keep you in, more than they keep others out. The more you hide the more you lose yourself.
3. Pick initiative over comfort. Don't worry about a life of initiative. Just choose action today over action tomorrow.
4. Select service over ease. Serving others seldom fits neatly into schedules. Ease is the enemy of meaning.
5. Tip toward gratitude rather than greed. Small souls have small impact. Just keep saying thank you.
6. Transform complaining, frustration, dissatisfaction, and unhappiness into opportunities to make a difference.

### Create small:

Big choices become small when you add the word, "today." For example, stop using others as excuses, *today*. Choose vulnerability over wall-building, *today*.

### Accept dull:

Dull comes before dramatic. Boring choices, that no one sees, make leaders. The path to remarkable begins unremarkably.

## ***Investing is hard, and a lifetime job***

Much attention is focused on constructing cost- and risk-efficient investment portfolios. The Thrift Savings Plan does an excellent job of supporting this effort by offering only ultra-low cost index funds, and preconfigured asset allocation models, in the form of the L Funds, that are carefully engineered to provide the maximum expected rate of return for varying levels of investment risk. In fact, it offers everything you need to build a superior portfolio—one that can be expected to outperform anything else out there. A cost- and risk-efficient portfolio is essential to any plan that seeks to maximize the lifetime income your lifetime income.

But, it’s a mistake to think that this is all you need to be successful in investing for retirement income. The truth is that constructing an exceptional portfolio is only the first step. Think of it like building the perfect rocket for a trip to the moon and back. While the right rocket is essential for a successful trip, it does not, on its own, guarantee success. The ship must be capable of the journey, but a good pilot can make up for certain shortcomings in design.

Without a clear understanding of your goals, resources and constraints, it’s impossible to know what’s best for you. And, without that knowledge, and the right understanding of portfolio navigation and control, it’s impossible to know how to manage that portfolio along the path to a successful outcome. How much of your resources you expose to risk at any point, how you allocated your resources to the various investment opportunities you have at your disposal and which securities you use to implement that allocation are all critical decisions that have to be made, again and again, until your goals have been met, or

your portfolio runs dry—whichever comes first.

To manage a portfolio successfully through a lifetime requires far more than simply deciding on the right asset allocation model today. It requires making that decision over and over again. When John Bogle, founder of Vanguard Funds, recommends that you use a total stock market index fund for your entire portfolio, he’s offering you a specific vehicle, not the operating instructions and a map.

Boilerplate strategies like buy-and-hold, value, growth and dividend investing don’t take your objectives and circumstances into account and, therefore, can’t be relied upon to succeed. What works for one investor might be a formula for failure of another.

Like any complex, lengthy and important project, managing your retirement portfolio to meet your needs requires skill, attention and effort from beginning to end. It’s a process that begins with plotting a course to your objectives, measuring your progress against expectation frequently, and correcting your course as you go, before it’s too late to recover from the unexpected.

When it comes to investing for maximum retirement income, there simply is no such thing as a reliable, set-it-and-forget-it investment strategy.
